THE PARABLE OF THE WEEDS

MATTHEW 13:24-43 (MATTHEW 13:24-30 SHORTER FORM)



Jesus continues teaching in parables, revealing different aspects of the kingdom of heaven. The Parable of the Weeds illustrates the coexistence of good and evil in the world.

The sower of good seed represents the Son of Man, while the enemy sowing weeds symbolizes the presence of evil. The harvest, representing the final judgement, underscores God's patience: the righteous and the wicked coexist for a time, but God will ultimately separate and bring justice.

The Parable of the Mustard Seed and the Parable of the Yeast emphasize the surprising growth and transformative power of the kingdom. The mustard seed, though tiny, becomes a large plant, and the yeast, though hidden, works through the whole dough. These images show that God's kingdom often begins in hidden, humble ways but expands and transforms creation profoundly.

Taken together, these parables teach about patience, hope, and God's sovereign plan. While we may witness evil or only small beginnings in the world, God's kingdom is active and growing, often in ways unseen. The passage encourages believers to trust God's timing, participate faithfully in his work, and remain vigilant. ■

REFLECT

Jesus' parables in this passage invite us to see God's kingdom in action in our everyday lives. The Parable of the Weeds reminds us that life is never perfect – good and evil often exist side by side. Yet God does not call us to despair. Instead, we are encouraged to remain faithful, sowing goodness, practising patience, and trusting that God will bring justice in his time.

The Parables of the Mustard Seed and the Yeast speak to the quiet, transformative power of small beginnings. A tiny seed becomes a sheltering plant, and a little yeast works through the whole dough. Our small acts of faith, love, and service may seem insignificant, but God can multiply them in ways beyond our imagination.

These parables challenge us to focus on what we can do, rather than the challenges around us. Every act of kindness, every word of encouragement, every prayer offered quietly, becomes part of God's growing kingdom. Discipleship is not about grand gestures alone, but faithful, patient commitment to letting God work through us, even in humble and unseen ways. ■

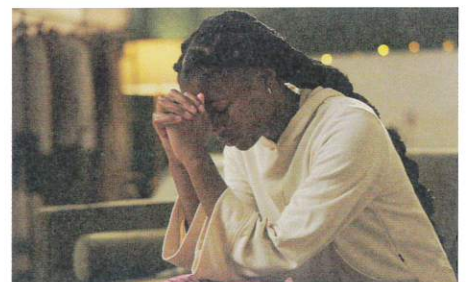
SAY

GOSPEL Matthew 13:24-43

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

(for shorter form read between > <)

>At that time: Jesus put another parable before the crowd, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field, but while his men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat and went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also. And the servants of the master of the house came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then does it have weeds?" He said to them, "An enemy has done this." So the servants said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?" But he said, "No, lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. Let both grow together until the harvest, and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, 'Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"
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He put another parable before them, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed that a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is larger than all the garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.'

He told them another parable. 'The kingdom of heaven is like leaven that a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, till it was all leavened.'

All these things Jesus said to the crowds in parables; indeed, he said nothing to them without a parable. This was to fulfil what was spoken by the prophet: 'I will open my mouth in parables; I will utter what has been hidden since the foundation of the world.'

Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, 'Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.' He answered, 'The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed is the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all law-breakers, and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear.'
